Security owned by IT is operational; security owned by leadership is strategic.

One of the most unifying insights of the chapter is that **information security cannot be owned by IT alone**. Information does not live exclusively in systems—it flows across **people, processes, technology, and decision-making**. As a result, security failures rarely originate from technical controls alone; they emerge from governance gaps, unclear accountability, and unmanaged organizational behavior.

When security is treated as an IT responsibility, it becomes reactive and tool-driven. When it is positioned as an organizational discipline—anchored in **leadership, governance, and accountability**—it becomes strategic, proactive, and resilient.
